Member Spotlight



The Timmermann's

We have decided to try something new in the newsletter, a spotlight on various members of the Historical Society and trying to get their stories. Our first spotlight is on Heinrich (Henry) Timmermann and his wife Emma. You will recognize the pair as they have attended most of our historical talks for years. Heinrich was born in Germany in 1926, and came to Wayne in 1932 as a boy with his family. He was a paperboy and knew Wayne well; his mother said he was gone all the time playing and exploring. He remembers climbing abandoned oil tanks, swinging from a chain swing in the old DUR depot, and the alligators kept in the old Wayne Waterworks plant. Henry remembers police chief Knox not being very nice to him or his family because they were German, and Knox was a WWI veteran. He also remembers the huge 1938 Goodman mill fire, which at the time was the largest fire in Wayne's history and burned for a week. He attended Roosevelt school, and St. Johns School, graduating in 1944. Because he was of German descent during the war years, he was not allowed to work in any wartime factories, could not own a gun, and could not leave the area around Wayne. Mr. Timmermann worked construction for a few years, and became a citizen in 1945. After seeing a pretty lady riding on a hay wagon ride, he finally met her at a St. Johns Church Halloween party in 1945. Emma and Henry said it was love at first sight and married February 9, 1946. The Timmermann's had five children, and Henry worked for Ford for a few years, then worked for Wixom for over 30 years. They remember Wayne before Urban Renewal as being a "Nice little town", all the churches were full and Wayne had the best shopping. The Timmermann's are a wealth of Wayne knowledge, so next time you see them at a presentation say hi, and wish them a happy 73rd anniversary in February.
